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I hope that you have a relaxing summer and that the weather has been better for you at home than it has here in Münster. As ever, it has been a busy yet rewarding period for the Regiment.

TRAINING: Our focus in the first half of this year has been with three periods of collective training. First, in March we deployed to Poland for Regimental armoured training. The exercise was set in an expeditionary context and conducted as an operational deployment. Initially troop-level training was conducted under squadron arrangements. The end of this phase coincided (quite by chance!) with St Patrick's Day, which was celebrated with gunfire, a drum head service, a Regimental photograph, and a Maintenance Day. On the evening of St Patrick's Day the sabre troops deployed into two assembly areas for the start of Regimental Troop Tests. Over the next

48 hours they completed two lanes within a common scenario. The first lane was a general warfighting advance to contact. The second lane was a convoy protection task, set in the context of a counter-insurgency operation, during which each Troop was confronted with a roadside improvised explosive device, an illegal vehicle check point and an atrocity being committed against civilians. The scenario allowed for an escalation/de-escalation between the two lanes as appropriate for each Troop. The standard was universally high, but in the end 1st Troop C Squadron (led by Sgt McCormick, with Cpl Richards as the Troop Sergeant) came out on top. 1st Troop D Squadron (Mr Morris and Sgt Jones) came a very close second. Thereafter, squadrons carried out their own training before deploying into hides for the start of a 36 hour Regimental exercise. There is no doubt from the reports I received from those who saw us go about our business that the Regiment performed to a characteristically high standard; a no-nonsense, highly professional and cheerful organisation on good form was the essence of the feedback. Specific reference was made to the manner in which everyone approached the training; I was particularly pleased to be told that we are the most robust armoured regiment the Armoured Training and Advisory Team have seen in recent times. Then in May we conducted dismounted training at Haltern. This was set in a counter insurgency environment and concentrated on team, multiple and squadron level operations in a rural setting. This period included Regimental Dismounted Troop Tests, which involved a forty-eight hour rural patrol, during which each Troop was required to deal with a range of tasks and situations with which they are likely to be confronted when in Iraq or other such operational theatres. As with mounted Troop Tests, competition was fierce and close, with 2<sup>nd</sup> Troop B Squad-

ron (Mr Hinckley and Sgt COMMANDING OFFICERS NOTES Lloyd) winning-out in the end. LT COL TD HYAMS

Thereafter, in June we conducted a two week period of live-fire training at Sennelager. Each Squadron spent a week conducting live-fire exercises mounted on their tanks (be that Challenger or Scimitar), focusing on urban and contemporary operating environment shoots, building on the more technical gunnery shoots conducted during an Annual Firing period. These were challenging battleruns, with both loaders and co-ax machine guns firing si-

multaneously, targets presented between 5 and 1200 metres and arcs described as "if it is presented, it is in arc." In their second week, squadrons moved to the dismounted role to conduct urban and fire-team rural live-fire battleruns. This was the first time an armoured regiment had conducted mounted and dismounted live-fire in the same period and in the context of the contemporary operating environment. In this regard we are leading the way for the RAC. During the middle weekend we were joined by some 120 wives and children for a Regimental Families Day, for whom we laid on a static display, bouncy castle (supervised by the troop leaders – a most effective form of contraception for young officers!) and children's assault course. After a BBQ lunch the day was rounded-off by a parachute display before the families departed for Münster, leaving the Regiment to watch England play Uruguay during the World Cup. Separately, Reconnaissance Troop spent two weeks earlier this month in Bavaria training with the German Mountain Troops. This is a link established by The King's Royal Hussars that we have maintained. We have invited the German Mountain Troops to send a number of their JNCOs with us to BATUS next year. The Langlauf team trained with them last year and will train again in Bad Reichenhall this winter. Reconnaissance Troop's exercise saw them conducting dismounted patrolling and Observation Post work in the mountains around Bad Reichenhall. It was demanding training that did much to reinforce the sense that Reconnaissance Troop is a high-grade organisation to which our young soldiers aspire to join. I understand that they were active also

on the local social scene.... The summer months have been dominated by conversion to the BOWMAN communications system. As a result of an immense amount of hard work by the NCOs and troopers our vehicle fleet has been presented to the highest standard for physical conversion by the contractors. Indeed the contractor's conversion manager told me that the fleet was the best presented he had seen across the Army to date. As I write we are in the midst of the five-week training period. Thereafter, we look forward to playing with this new beast during our field training in Poland; I will report back in the next newsletter! Poland will mark the start of a training cycle that will take us to BATUS next summer and then on to Pre-Deployment Training next autumn; itself the pre-cursor to operations at the end of 2007. This training cycle will see A Squadron join 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Scots Guards Battlegroup and C Squadron join The Duke of Lancaster's Regiment Battlegroup. The Regimental Battlegroup will comprise PoW, B & D Squadrons, C Company 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Scots Guards, Burma Company and the Anti-Tank and Mortar Platoons from 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, The Duke of Lancaster's Regiment.

**REGIMENTAL LIFE:** In June we were delighted to be joined by the Colonel of the Regiment and the Old Comrades Association for the Dettingen Weekend. We had designed the weekend as a family event, appealing to those at Regimental Duty and the wives and children just as much as the old comrades. The weekend included an all-ranks dance, inter-squadron boxing evening, a parade and drum-head service, a static display demonstrating the capabilities of the modern Regiment, and the finals of the various inter-squadron sporting competitions (rugby, cricket, football, hockey and tug-of-war). Catering Troop laid on a series of BBQ lunches, and some of the best food I have seen at an all-ranks dance. All-in-all, a wonderful Regimental weekend. Remaining, somewhat unusually, with matters ceremonial, we were tasked earlier this summer with providing a Guard of Honour for the swearing-in of new recruits into the Bundeswehr's Wacht (Ceremonial) Battalion. This is a high-profile event held on the anniversary of Count von Staufenberg's execution on Hitler's orders, to which the British had been invited for the first time. The Secretary of State for Defence from both governments took the salute. Once we had come to terms with the concept of performing foot drill on a hot and humid July evening live in front of an audience of thousands in the stands and (apparently) millions on German national television, it was enormous fun. Both our German hosts and the German press were extremely complementary about our performance. The Second-in-Command of the Wacht Battalion described our performance as 'near perfect' and much was made in the German Press of the fact that we are armoured soldiers who did this with little practice, whereas the German contingent are full-time ceremonial troops. It was a characteristically stylish and professional performance from the Regiment.

Mrs Sandra Wilkinson, so well known to many of you, has retired and her last day of service at HHQ was on the 15 September. ## LIEUTENANT GENERAL SIR ADRIAN CARTON de WIART, VC. KBE, CB, CMG, DSO.

Born in Brussels (Belgium) on 5th May 1880. Died in Killinardrich, County Cork (Ireland) on 5th June 1963. Author of the book 'Happy Odyssey'. Wounded 11 times on active service, of which 8 times during the First World War. Colonel 4/7DG 1940 - 1948.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1916, Lieutenant Colonel Adrian Carton de Wiart, 4<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards (Royal Irish), attached to and Commanding Officer of the 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Gloucestershire Regiment, inspired his men in La Boisselle with such energy, inspiration and courage that the Victoria Cross was bestowed on him. He was probably the only Belgian participating in the Battle of the Somme in July 1916. Exactly 90 years later, on 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2006, the Belgian National Remembrance Committee inaugurated a commemorative plaque at the church of Thiepval. In the presence of 12 standards of war veterans and patriotic associations, two members of the family and the chairman of the Committee evoked Sir Adrian's life and military career, followed by the reading of the citation awarding the Victoria Cross and of the special message of the Victoria Cross Association. Countess Renée-Victoire de la Kéthulle de Ryhove, born Carton de Wiart, the only person present to have known Sir Adrian, unveiled a commemorative plaque, blessed by the Chaplain of the Committee, the Reverend Dirk Milio.

Campaigns: South Africa 1902, Somaliland 1914, World Wars I and II. Officer with the 4th Dragoon Guards (Royal Irish), Attached to the 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Gloucestershire Regiment (on the Somme) 1916, Commanding the British Military Mission in Poland 1918-1924, British Military Mission attached to the Polish Army 1939, Central Expeditionary Force during the Norwegian Campaign 1940, Military Mission in Yugoslavia – taken prisoner in 1941 for 2 years, Released in 1943 in order to negotiate the surrender of the Italian Army in 1943, Special Military Representative with General Chiang-Kai-Shek 1943.

**Decorations**: Victoria Cross, Knight Commander in the Order of the British Empire, Companion in the Order of the Bath, Companion in the Order of Saint-Michael and Saint-George, Distinguished Service Order, Officer's Cross in the Order of the Crown and Croix de Guerre (Belgium), Croix de Guerre and Légion d'Honneur (France), Cross of Merit 1920 and 1939 (Poland).

Citation of the Victoria Cross in The London Gazette of 9 September 1916: "On 2/3 July 1916 at La Boisselle, France, Lieutenant Colonel Carton de Wiart's dauntless courage and inspiration averted what could have been a serious reverse. He displayed the utmost energy in forcing the attack home and after three other battalion commanders had become casualties, he controlled their commands and made sure that the ground was held at all costs. In organising the positions to be held, he exposed himself fearlessly to enemy fire. He was wounded eight times (including the loss of an eye and his left hand) during the course of the First World War."

Excerpt from "The British Campaign in France and Flanders 1916" by Arthur Conan Doyle p.108. - Hodder & Stoughton 1928: "By 9 pm. on July 2 the south end of the village (La Boisselle) had been captured but the resistance was still very fierce. Two British colonels, one of the 7<sup>th</sup> South Lancashires and the other of the 8<sup>th</sup> Gloucesters, particularly distinguished themselves in this close fighting. The latter, a dragoon like his commander, was a hard soldier who had left an eye in Somaliland and a hand at Ypres, but the sight of him in this day of battle, tearing out the safety-pin of bombs with his teeth and hurling them with his remaining hand, was one which gave heart to his men."

#### VETERANS' BADGE

The eligibility to apply for a HM Armed Forces Veterans' Badge has been extended to those veterans who served at any time up to 31 December 1959. After the demand from this group of veterans has been met we will further extend the eligibility to apply until all veterans have received their badge. The HM Forces Veterans' Badge was launched in May 2004 with the intention that it would be made available to all First World War veterans and the Second World War veterans who, under the Heroes Return scheme, travelled back to the battlefronts they had fought on. Because the badge was so popular, eligibility was quickly extended to include all Second World War veterans and those who have served at any time up to 31 December 1954. Further extensions to the eligibility criteria of the Badge will be announced in due course. Included in eligibility for the Veterans Badge are the widow(er)s of those Service personnel whose spouse died as a result of an injury or illness attributable to their military service and who are in receipt of a United Kingdom war widow(er)'s pension. Applications for the badge detailing, name, address, date of birth, service number, period of service and theatres of service should be sent to Veterans Services, Veterans Agency, Norcross, Blackpool, FY5 3WP. ## THE VETERANS AGENCY

In April 2002, as part of the Government's Veteran Initiative, the War Pensions Agency was renamed the Veterans Agency. The new name reflects the intention for the Veterans Agency to provide a single point of contact within the MOD for all veterans' issues. The Veterans Initiative gives clear recognition to the special status of those who have served in the armed forces and the unique contribution they have made to the country. It works towards better co-ordination and communications not only with the veterans community, but also across Government and with charities and the voluntary sector - to improve the level of services and support available for veterans and their families. It is responsible for the assessment, administration and payment of war and war widow(er)s' pensions and supplementary allowances, and the new Armed Forces Compensation Scheme. It manages the free veterans Helpline, (the War Pensioners Welfare Service (the face-to-face ad\ice arm of Veterans Agency based in 25 offices throughout the UK and Eire). Callers to the Agency's help line - 0800 169 2277- can receive advice on a wide range of subjects such as service records, health, employment, accommodation, finance, statutory entitlements, war pensions, medals, medals, military graves and welfare issues. Lines are open, Mon-Thurs 8 15am-5 15pm, Friday 8 15am - 4 30pm The veterans website at www.veteransagency.mod.uk was launched in 2002 and was redesigned in October last year, the site includes a comprehensive search facility to access almost 20,000 pages of information including useful links to other organisations and Government departments A full electronic version of the newsletter VETERANS WORLD can also be found on this website. ESHRA offer advice on all ex-service Care Homes, Respite and Short Welfare Breaks, as well as Independent Living, Sheltered Accommodation, and funding problems. In conjunction with advice GIVEN regarding the Ex-service homes and accommodation a database is used which incorporates registered Care Homes providing Residential and/or Nursing care in the Voluntary and Private sectors. It also includes information for Local Authority homes Details are also available on Retirement Housing to rent and buy In addition other sources are used to enable a wider search range if required. Information has been accumulated from various sources, like Help the Aged. Counsel and Care, and numerous others which enables relevant and useful information to be passed on to people who often find themselves not knowing where to start.

QUESTIONS: A loved one is suddenly in hospital having had a stroke, where do they go from here? A couple just wants advice on Respite places, or they want to move into sheltered accommodation in a different area. Service 1 - WGFDS will deliver the following choice of flowers to the appropriate cemetery in France or Belgium where they will be placed in front of the headstone 8 white lilies, 8 red, white or yellow roses or a spray of 12 flowers. Cost: World War I cemeteries £34.00, World War II cemeteries £37.50. **Service 2** - WGFDS will purchase a single rose or lily and deliver it to the appropriate cemetery where it will be placed in front of the headstone. Cost: World War I cemeteries £24.00, World War II cemeteries £27.50. Service 3:-WGFDS will take a photograph of the headstone of a fallen soldier. ## M6 TOLL EXEMPTIONS

The M6 Toll motorway was opened in January 2004. It is a 27-mile, three lane motorway and is Britain's first toll motorway. Some vehicles will be exempt from paying a toll when they use the M6 Toll motorway. Disabled customers can use the motorway free of charge by applying in advance for a Mobility Exemption Pass. Veterans Agency customers who are in receipt of a War Pensioners' Mobility Supplement will be exempt from this M6 Toll charge. Customers will be required to produce a photocopy of their Vehicle Exemption Certificate (WPA 0442) with their application form. #### **Dunkirk: Fight To The Last Man**

This recently published book contains a new angle on how the 1940 British Expeditionary Force came to be evacuated from Dunkirk: it was not just because of the courage of the men on the beaches as they were rescued by the Navy and those celebrated little ships. According to author Hugh Sebag-Montefiore, the evacuation would never have taken place had it not been for the bravery of the British soldiers who were left behind to hold back the Germans while the evacuation went ahead. While units such as the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards and the 4th/7th Royal Dragoon Guards were retreating from the Franco-Belgian border to the Dunkirk perimeter, a series of rearguard actions were being fought around 20 miles to the south of Dunkirk. It was these actions which were to determine the fate of the British Army. Battle was joined at this point because the British Commander-in-Chief Lord Gort had decided there was only one way to save the majority of the British troops in France: the infantry backed by whatever armour could be mustered had to shield the corridor up which the British Army was retreating to Dunkirk by holding a string of strong points. They were to stand and fight, whatever cost, even if they had to fight to the last man. This they proceeded to do. However, their rearguard actions fought at towns and villages such as Cassel, Ledringhem, Wormhout and Le Paradis have been forgotten by previous histories of the 1940 campaign. It is unlikely they will be omitted from future accounts. Anyone who reads this book will know the true story of how the British Army in France was really evacuated. It should be noted that the book's author had hoped to write up some of the most heroic battles fought by the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards (in particular their actions inside the Dunkirk perimeter) and the 4th/7th Royal Dragoon Guards (in particular their last ditch action at Lessines) during the campaign. Unfortunately he was unable to do so because he could not find enough vivid accounts of their progress and retreat. If any soldiers from these units, or their families and friends, have accounts which vividly describe what happened to them during the 1940 Dunkirk campaign, the author would be pleased to hear from them - ideally before the publications of next year's paperback edition of this book - at 37 Tanza Road, London, NW3 2UA, email address seabags@dircon.co.uk Dunkirk: Fight To The Last Man is published by Viking/Penguin and can be purchased from most bookshops for £25.

# GET SAFE ONLINE - BANK ONLINE SAFELY

**Risks:** Phishing, which means being tricked into disclosing your password and details to online criminals. Identity theft caused by viruses or spyware, giving criminals access to your bank account and other personal information stored on your computer.

**Don't be fooled by impostors:** One of the biggest risks in banking online is identity theft. Fraudsters send out emails that look like they come from banks (or other trusted organisations) and which contain links to fake websites which also resemble the real thing. Phishing scams are like a fake cashpoint machine that looks like the real thing.

Be wary of phishing emails. These may appear to be from your bank but are really from criminals trying to lure you to a fake website to get your personal information. Banks will never send you emails asking you to disclose PIN numbers, passwords or other personal information or which link to a page that asks you for this kind of information. If you click on a link in an email that takes you to a page that requires a password or personal information, it is very likely to be a scam. Always make sure you are using a secure Internet connection to connect to your bank. Look for 'https' at the beginning of the address and the padlock symbol. Although many trusted organisations do send emails containing legitimate links (for example to websites that contain more information on a given subject), always be careful when clicking on them. It is better to enter your bank's address into your web browser directly or use a bookmark that you created using the correct address. If you believe your details may have been compromised in some way, always contact the bank.

Make sure your computer is secure: Because criminals can get your passwords and personal information using viruses or spyware, it is vital that your computer is as secure as possible. In particular: install anti-virus software, stop spyware, use a firewall and get the latest Windows updates.

Use common sense: Learn your password and PIN. Destroy any written record as soon as you can.. Don't write down your password or PIN. Use different passwords for bank and credit card sites. Don't use the same password for every website. Don't fall for money-laundering scams. Be wary of any 'business opportunity' that involves receiving or holding money for strangers. A good source for further information, including information about known frauds, is your own bank's website.

Keep tabs on your money: If you spot any unusual transactions in your statement, report them immediately.
