Commanding Officer's Notes

I wrote to you last in June; this newsletter aims to bring you up to date with events of the past 6 months.

Training

Having returned from Iraq in June 2008 and spent the latter part of last year recuperating, 2009 has been a year of 2 halves. To use the current military jargon, we spent the first 7 months of this year conducting Hybrid Foundation Training in other words generic warfare training. We are currently conducting Mission Specific Training (MST) ahead of our deployment to Afghanistan in March 2010.

The Regiment returned from Summer Leave in late August 2009 and commenced MST immediately. Whilst the organisation for our forthcoming tour was - at the time (i.e. in August 2009) - still very much TBC (more of which later) it became obvious that we would have to fold four sabre squadrons into three. And so (sadly) we did; the majority of the deployable manpower from A Sqn was 'folded' into B, C and D Sqns.

The MST 'conveyor belt' is now a tried and tested period of training. For the Regiment it included the following activities, all of which had to be completed during Sep-Dec 09 (in chronological order): Command and Staff Trainer - 1 week; Combined Arms Tactical Trainer - 1 week; All Ranks Briefing - 2 days; Tactical Commanders' Cadre - 1 week; Cascade Training - 5 weeks; Confirmatory Exercise - 1 week; and Live Fire Tactical Training - 2 days. Additionally, there have been significant periods of individual training, the most burdensome of which has been a myriad of driving related courses (e.g. conversion to Viking, Mastiff, Ridgeback, Husky, WMIK, Vixen, Vector, Springer etc). And as well as driving courses there have been countless language, Team Medic, weapons, intelligence, search, cultural awareness, communications, ECM, helicopter handling and Theatre IT courses.

I won't go into the detail of all the above activities but I will just say a few words about the confirmatory exercise we conducted in Nov-Dec 09. The aim of the exercise was to confirm that we had conducted our Cascade Training correctly and learned the relevant (essentially Infantry) drills and techniques. The exercise lasted 1 week and was conducted at Thetford in Norfolk. It consisted of the following 4 x 36 hour stands: compound clearance, explosive method of entry and site sensitive exploitation; framework patrolling based out of a Forward Operating Base (FOB); cordon operations, casualty evacuation and reaction to Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) and Indirect Fire; and finally clearance of the 'Green Zone' - i.e. Close Quarter Battle (CQB) along a 2 km stretch of river surrounded by crops, trees, bushes etc. The exercise was conducted in the dismounted role and was very well resourced. For example, all Sqns interacted with GR4 Tornado, Apache Attack Helicopter, Chinook, Merlin and Sea King helicopters; and an organisation known as 'Amputees in Action' (consisting of individuals who have lost legs/arms in motor bike accidents etc) was utilised to add genuine realism to casualty evacuation incidents. And - much like Canada back in May-Jul 09 - significant numbers of Afghans were involved in the exercise to give it a more authentic feel. All in all it was an outstanding week's training.

OPERATIONS IN AFGHANISTAN IN 2010

Turning now to next year, and specifically the Regiment's imminent deployment to Afghanistan. Despite deploying there in less than 4 months time, the 2 x RAC Regts (RDG and QRL) and 6 x Inf Bns (40 Cdo, 1 SG, 1 SCOTS, 1 MERCIAN, 1 LANCS and 1 RGR) who are due to contribute force elements (FE) on Op HERRICK 12 (Apr-Oct 10) are still unclear on exactly where in Helmand Province they are going and what they will be doing. My fellow Commanding Officers and I find this deeply unsettling. Nevertheless, I am confident - based on what I know today - that about 400 members of the Regiment will deploy to Afghanistan.

The breakdown is currently due to be as follows:

- B Sqn (about 80 soldiers) will deploy in Mastiff armoured vehicles in the protected mobility role - Apr-Oct 10.
- C Sqn (about 100 soldiers) will deploy as a Police Mentoring Team - that is to say they will mentor the Afghan National Police - Apr-Oct 10.
- D Sqn (about 125 soldiers) will deploy in Viking armoured vehicle (which will be replaced by Warthog in the protected mobility role - Jun-Dec 10).
- Recce Tp (about 25 soldiers) will deploy to Kandahar (i.e. not Helmand) in Ridgeback to form Commander Regional Command (South)'s Tactical Group (i.e. they will provide a Protected Mobility function for the 2-star General (currently British) who commands all ISAF troops in Southern Afghanistan).
- Battle Group Headquarters and the Echelon is training generically to deploy in whatever role the Brigade Commander deems fit.
- And finally, we have about 25 soldiers spread across the Brigade Reconnaissance Force and Task Force Helmand's Light Aid Detachment.

This will be the Regiment's first deployment to Afghanistan. I sense the soldiers and officers are genuinely hungry to deploy, to help the people of Helmand Province make their country a better place, and to further develop the Afghan National Security Forces. But it is a daunting task and our soldiers are only too aware of what it is that is being asked of them. Many have friends who have returned from Helmand with truly harrowing stories. Some are scared. Many are anxious. But everyone is focused and we are investing significant time in preparing the Regiment emotionally for the tough times that inevitably lie ahead. But we do so safe in the knowledge that we are truly blessed in having such a supportive wider Regimental family.

Regimental Secretary's Notes

I can't believe its time for my second newsletter, here at Home Headquarters we have a new Colonel of The Regiment; Brigadier Johnny Torrens-Spence, for those of you who don't know him he was the first Commanding Officer of The Royal Dragoon Guards, which just goes to show how far we have come since the amalgamation. In addition we have had a change in the museum, Trevor Johnson has retired from the museum attendant job and has been replaced by Meredydd Jones in the upgraded museum assistant post, which makes him the assistant curator. While I'm on the topic of museum, there are great changes in the offing, many of which are dependant on funding. It is planned to create a York Military Museum, to achieve this we will join forces with Yorkshire Regiment to create a museum that will hopefully endure for years to come. It will serve to consolidate the links the regiment have with the city just as it has in Enniskillen, which in turn will assist with recruiting. And lastly a plea, if you do move or change your email address please keep us up to date if you want to be kept up to date.

Topical Interest

Remembrance - The Two Minutes Silence

'The two minutes' silence to commemorate the first anniversary of the ceasefire of 11 o'clock on 11 November 1918 was almost as much of a surprise to the general public as the ceasefire itself had been. The decision to mark the first anniversary of the Armistice with a silent pause in the life of the nation was taken very close to the anniversary itself. The origins of the silence can be found in a minute dated 4 November 1919, submitted to Lord Milner for the consideration of the War Cabinet by Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, former British High Commissioner to the Dominion of South Africa. His son had been killed in France in 1917. He wrote: "In the hearts of our people there is a real desire to find some lasting expression of their feeling for those who gave their lives in the war. They want something done now while the memories of sacrifice are in the minds of all; for there is the dread – too well grounded in experience – that those who have gone will not always be first in the thoughts of all, and that when the fruits of their sacrifice become our daily bread, there will be few occasions to remind us of what we realise so clearly today. During the War, we in South Africa observed what we called the "Three minutes' pause". At noon each day, all work, all talk and all movement were suspended for three minutes that we might concentrate as one in thinking of those – the living and the dead – who had pledged and given themselves for all that we believe in ... "

Reaching Veterans in Prison

It is important that those veterans who sadly find themselves in prison are aware of the advice and support available to them as ex-Service personnel and the arrangements being made to better reach them. Prison In-Reach (PIR) is an initiative that aims to ensure all veterans that are prison or probation offenders, their families and resettlement services are fully informed of the forms and levels of support available to them whether from the SPVA or the ex-Service charities. This includes the help they can get before as well as after release. The work of Prison In-Reach is designed to contribute to the wider Government goals of reducing the risk of re-offending.

If you know any veterans in prison or their families, please draw the work of Prison In-Reach (PIR) to their attention and the main sources of advice and support described above. The more veterans in prison that are aware of the advice and support on offer, the more we should be able to help.

Elizabeth Cross

Her Majesty The Queen has given her name to a new form of recognition for the families of British Service personnel killed while serving their country. The Elizabeth Cross will be granted to the next of kin of Armed Forces personnel killed on operations or as a result of terrorism in a mark of national recognition for their loss. Next of kin will receive the Elizabeth Cross plus a memorial scroll signed by the queen, which will bear the name of the person who died. This memorial cross will not just be granted to families who have lost loved ones in recent operations, it will also be available to the families of those who died in conflicts dating back to 1948, including the Korean War, the Falklands War and operations in Northern Ireland. Replacing Campaign Medals

Medals for campaign service are supposed to be treasured possessions, reflecting service to one's country and awarded by The Sovereign on behalf of a grateful nation. While their market value is often only superficial (though some can be quite valuable, particularly awards for gallantry), the recipient is expected to treat them with care and be mindful of their security.

In view of this, once medals are issued they become the sole responsibility of the original recipient, or his/her next of kin. They will not, therefore, be replaced by the MOD if they are lost. The only exception to this rule is if the medals are stolen or accidentally destroyed beyond the control of the owner, for example in a house fire. In these cases the MOD may replace the medal if proof of the loss is provided in the form of a Police Report or a claim to an insurance company. A charge is made for medals that are replaced to cover the cost of manufacture and a nominal charge for administration. It should be noted that in many cases the replacement medals will be stamped as such to avoid confusion with the originals should they ever be found. For those who have lost their medals in circumstances other than this, please do not apply to the MOD for replacements. In these cases it is recommended you approach a reputable medal dealer to obtain them (look in Yellow Pages). In most cases you will be surprised at how reasonably priced campaign medals are. Some people have suggested that second hand medals from a commercial supplier are less original than replacements bought from the MOD. This is not necessarily so. It should be borne in mind that the MOD does not hold vast stocks of new, un-issued medals dating back 50 years. The Royal Mint is still manufacturing medals for Second World War campaign service and supplies the medal offices in batches. Replacement medals will probably be of very recent manufacture, rather than date back to the late 1940s, so medals purchased from a commercial medal dealer may be, in fact, no more or less "original" than those supplied by the MOD.

Do I need to register my mobility scooter with the DVLA?

The DVLA (Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency) recently confirmed that all Class 3 vehicles (which include some powered wheelchairs and scooters) must be registered for road and licensed in the exempt 'disabled' taxation class. This does not apply to Class 2 vehicles.

Class 3 vehicles are generally larger than Class 2 vehicles and they are capable of exceeding 4mph, but not exceeding 8mph. They are required by law to have lights, indicators, a horn, rear view mirrors and rear reflectors, but they are not allowed to travel on motorways, cycles lanes or bus lanes. Class 2 vehicles are not allowed on the roads other than to cross them.

To register and license a Class 3 vehicle you need to complete Form V55/5 (for used vehicles) and take or send the form to your local DVLA office. You can find your nearest office by telephoning 0870 243 0444, by looking in the V100 information leaflet which is available from post offices that issue tax discs, or by visiting the website www.direct.gov.uk/motoring. To get the form you need you can either ask your dealer for the appropriate form or call the DVLA on 0870 240 0010 and someone will send you the form you need.

You will need to provide evidence of the vehicle's age (if available) and this will need to be submitted with the application together with documentation confirming the keeper's name and address. You will be given a nil duty vehicle licence (tax disc), which you will need to display on your vehicle.

Balkerne Hill, Colchester

Balkerne Gate is the oldest recorded surviving Roman gateway in Britain and formed part of the main entrance to the town of Colchester at that time, the remains of which can be clearly seen today and sits on what is known as Balkerne Hill. It formed part of the triumphal arch built to celebrate the entrance of Roman Emperor Claudius into Camulodunum (the present Colchester).

In 1976 Balkerne Hill was cut through to form the present dual carriageway, one of the main arterial routes into the town. Along one side of the carriageway are displayed the Cap Badges of the Regiments that have been connected with Colchester and a magnificent sight they are.

Joining them now and proudly shining like a beacon is the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards.

Folklore has it that Balkerne Hill is connected with two nursery rhymes. The Grand Old Duke of York marched his men to the top and down the other being Humpty Dumpty, that was not an egg but a cannon that fell from the Balkerne ramparts and could not be put together again as it was so badly damaged.
