My predecessor has brought you up to speed on the Regiment's first-rate performance in Iraq in previous newsletters and thus I won't repeat that story, rather I will attempt to give you a feel for what's been going on since July 2008.

Arms Plot

After 18 months of intense activity the Regiment is now settled in Catterick and enjoying a period of relative calm. Whilst regiments such as ours conduct arms plots relatively routinely, moving from Munster to Catterick immediately following an operational tour was always going to be a challenge, and is not an experience we would wish to repeat. Nevertheless, the move went exceptionally smoothly and we are now settled firmly in North Yorkshire, only an hour's drive north from one of our principal recruiting areas.

Recuperation

Notwithstanding the small matter of an arms plot, the Regiment has enjoyed a period of recuperation which ended on 4 Jan 09. By recuperation I mean that, on the whole, the chain of command has left us alone to: catch-up on career courses; conduct low-level individual training; participate in numerous sporting competitions and adventure training expeditions; and take numerous long weekends/periods of leave – in order to ensure our collective batteries are recharged prior to the training year which commenced on 5 Jan 09 (more of which later).

Sport. Whilst a number of sporting 'gladiators' have participated at representative level (Corps, Army and Combined Services) the focus has been at squadron and regimental level. And the highlight was very definitely the Inter-Squadron sports week in early Nov 08 where the following prizes were awarded:


- Volleyball (Steinfair Cup) B Sqn.

Watching soldiers from across all 5 squadrons playing water-polo (for example) was a sight I will never forget. Of the 50 or so competitors, only about 10 had ever played water-polo before, but the remaining 40 got stuck-in and the competition was fierce. And this spirit was evident across the board. It was a wonderful week and one we hope to repeat

in 2009. Finally, on the sporting front, we held a regimental boxing night in Dec 08, where we were privileged to witness a truly outstanding evening's boxing as 18 members of the Regiment fought bravely and indeed skilfully. It was a thor-

oughly 'regimental' evening, held on the last 'working' night of 2008 – the perfect end to what has been an outstanding year.

Adventure Training. Numerous soldiers from across the Regiment have participated in some form of adventure training. A number have travelled to California to complete a freefall parachute course, and others have competed at the Kiel regatta, to name but a couple of the regimental expeditions. And we sent 2 winter sports' teams to Austria: one to ski and the other

to snow-board. Finally, a team of 13 soldiers participated in the Official Mountain Marathon (OMM) in the Lake District in October 2008. The OMM (billed as the "premier UK event to test teamwork, self-reliance, endurance, outdoor and navigational skills") was a huge success and the RDG team raised significant money for a colleague of the Regiment's who was severely wounded in Iraq. A photo of two RDG soldiers also made page 3 of the Daily Telegraph as they recounted their experiences following the most ghastly weather conditions seen by the Lake District in decades.

Parades. The Regiment has participated in 3 parades of note since July 2008

Clarence House Medal Parade

The Colonel-in-Chief presented Op TELIC (Iraq) campaign medals to 100 members of the Regiment following their return from Iraq. The Regiment marched from Wellington Barracks, up the Mall and into Clarence House on a blisteringly hot afternoon. Huge crowds cheered as the Regiment made its way, dressed in desert combats, into the gardens of Clarence House, where a number of wives and children were waiting to watch as the Colonel-in-Chief spoke individually to each and every soldier on parade that day whilst presenting them with their medal. Following this, the Colonel-in-Chief hosted all on parade at a garden party where he circulated amongst the soldiers and their families whilst listening to tales from the tour.

Freedom of the City of York. The Regiment exercised its freedom by forming-up at York Minster and then marching through the streets of York with swords drawn, bayonets

fixed and the band playing. It was a truly memorable day and one those on Parade will never forget. Whilst we were in fact simply exercising our freedom of the city of York, it felt more like a 'the good citizens of York would like to show their appreciation to RDG soldiers who we know have just returned from Operations' type parade, as the streets were literally packed with thousands of well-wishers, and one could really sense that all those marching behind me had grown an inch with pride. And then, in the afternoon, we returned to Catterick for an Open Day aimed principally at the Regimental Association, friends and families before ending the day with a Beating Retreat prior to each of the Messes hosting individual parties.

Homecoming Parade in Belfast. Belfast City organised a parade – for the first time since 1946 – for Irish soldiers in the British Army to march through the streets of Belfast. No doubt some of you will have seen coverage in the national press marking this historic occasion, but 30 Irish RDG soldiers participated in the parade. Whilst I was sadly not there to witness it, I'm told the reception given to all on parade was similar to that which we experienced in York but on a much grander scale; there were about 25,000 well-wishers lining the streets and our boys literally couldn't hear the band playing only a few yards in front of them due to the immense vocal cheering and general support of the crowd.

A number of soldiers have commented to me that they have never felt so valued by the general public, and parades such as those mentioned above are absolutely vital if we are to get out there and persuade young mothers that their sons should join an organisation such as ours.

LIVING IN CATTERICK

Whilst inevitably there were some who were sad to leave Germany the majority are now delighted to be based in Catterick. There are many positive aspects to living here (closer to family and friends, increased job opportunities for spouses etc) but the one I wish to touch briefly on is the soldiers' single living accommodation. All RDG single soldiers now have their own rooms complete with en-suite shower-rooms. The facilities are quite literally first-class and very definitely viewed as retention positive. It is also worth mentioning we are now subject to Whole Fleet Management (WFM); that is to say (for example) A, B and D Sqns each hold 4 x Challenger 2 (rather than 14) and C Sqn holds 8 x Scimitar (rather than 14) on the tank park here in Catterick, and the plan is that we receive an increase to our holdings prior to critical training activity. There are pros and cons, of course, to such an arrangement, but WFM is here to stay and thus we are best to embrace it and make it work for us.

MANNING

Whilst there has been the inevitable flurry of Notice to Terminates (NTT) following an operational tour and then an arms plot, the RDG manning situation is not unhealthy, particularly when viewed against other units in the Brigade and indeed across the RAC. We are currently -25 set against an establishment of 405 RDG soldiers. Rest assured though, we are far from complacent. The aim has to be full manning and nothing less is acceptable.

Now that we are based in Yorkshire we must make the most of exploiting the opportunity to recruit yet more soldiers from an area which has been very fruitful for us over the years, and is now but an hour's drive to our south. I have set in place a number of new initiatives – all which compliment my predecessor's manning plan – one of which is to affiliate each of the ACFs to our 5 squadrons, and another is to 'divide' Yorkshire into 3 and then affiliate each of these areas to a sabre squadron and affiliate Northern Ireland to the remaining sabre squadron. This will enable each of the squadrons to more actively engage – and contribute to – the critical activity of recruiting.

WHAT NEXT?

And so enough of the past, what about the future? Well – like every other Regiment in the British Army – we remain an operationally focused organisation: the minute one returns from one operation, so preparation for the next commences, and already we are focused on deploying on operations in 2010. 4 Mechanized Brigade is just waiting to hear to where we will be deployed, but all the indicators point to Afghanistan; although I must stress this has yet to be confirmed and we will, undoubtedly, experience the inevitable 'on the bus/off the bus' shenanigans associated with being warned off for one theatre, and then all of a sudden something happens to change that decision. Anyway, fingers crossed for Afghanistan.

But regardless of theatre, the headlines for 2009 are as follows: annual firing at Castlemartin in March; field training in Canada in May-July; and then Pre-Deployment Training (PDT) will commence in the Autumn as we prepare for whatever 2010 throws at us.

The Standing Area has been extended within the secure compound, enabling families and guests to attend the service behind the Regimental detachments on the grass around the bandstand. ARMED FORCES DAY 27 JUNE 2009

Armed Forces Day honours the outstanding contribution made by current members of the Armed Forces and by veterans of all ages. Held on the 27 June, the day will be an opportunity for us all to join together to pay tribute to our Armed Forces past, present and future. On the day itself, and in the weeks leading up to it, events will take place across the country, ranging from national and regional celebrations, to dozens of local events organised by councils, ex-Service organisations, community groups and schools.

John Hutton, Secretary of State for Defence, said: Members of the Armed Forces and veterans are of all ages and backgrounds, reflecting the diverse nature of Britain today. Current members of the Armed Forces show professionalism and dedication both at home and abroad, often working in the most challenging of circumstances. Veterans have honoured their commitment to defend our country's interests in Service, and are now valuable members of their local communities. With the establishment of Armed Forces Day, the 27 June is a chance to honour the achievements of the Armed Forces yesterday and today.

Chris Simpkins, Director General, Royal British Legion said: The Royal British Legion applauds the introduction of Armed Forces Day and we will lend our fullest support to events celebrating the achievements and contribution of the Armed Forces people past, present and future.

Who are Veterans?

A veteran is anyone who has served in HM Armed Forces at any time (including National Servicemen and Reservists), irrespective of length of service.

What's the difference between Armed Forces Day and Remembrance Sunday?

The focus of Armed Forces Day is on celebrating both the past and the continuing contributions of our Armed Forces and veterans. The intention is that Armed Forces Day will become as familiar and respected as Remembrance Sunday, which remembers and honours those who died serving their country.

Armed Forces Day Chatham 2009

The Historic Dockyard Chatham has won the competition to host the first national Armed Forces Day event on 27 June 2009, which will be complemented by hundreds of events in towns and cities across the UK. The Dockyard is set in the heart of an area rich in military and Defence history. Tens of thousands of Service men and women have served, passed though, or retired here, or as civilians have worked for the Royal Navy in the Royal Dockyard or for other naval establishments on the Medway.

Admiral Sir Ian Garnett KCB, Chairman of the Chatham Historic Dockland Trust, said: It is both an honour and a privilege for The Historic Dockyard Chatham, in the heart of Medway, Kent, to be the venue for the UK's first National Armed Forces Day. With over 400 years of military history, we are looking forward to arranging a family event that will recognise the many achievements of today's Armed Forces and veterans.

Plans for the event are still being finalised, and will include:

- Have-a-go displays and activities with the Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air
- Force
- Free entry to Medway attractions for Veterans Badge holders and current
- members of the Armed Forces
- Celebratory peals of bells from the Churches of Medway
- Fly-pasts and aerial displays.
