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Commanding Officer's Notes

TRAINING IN CATTERICK

Having recovered from Operations in Iraq in Jun 08 and then recuperated during the latter half of last year, the focus for 2009 was all about training, initially in our primary role (CR2 and CVR(T)) Jan-Jul 09 and then in our secondary role (still TBC) Aug-Dec 09.

The headlines for the first half of 2009 included Gunnery Camp and BATUS – more of which later – but first we needed to re-familiarise ourselves with CR2 and CVR(T), having spent the past 18 months on different platforms. And so Jan and Feb 09 were filled with basic and very low-level training events, principally on Catterick Training Area (CTA). On the one hand this was extremely useful as CTA is literally right next door to our back gate and the opportunity to conduct the basics (hides, replens etc) was very valuable. However, on the other hand crews are sadly not able to manoeuvre freely across CTA as all tracked vehicles have to remain on the single 'tank driver training route'. Therefore, genuine tank manoeuvre – as the majority of us were lucky enough to grow up with – would have to wait until BATUS. Nevertheless, the opportunity to train – both mounted and dismounted – so close to home is very welcome.

GUNNERY CAMP

The majority of you will be used to deploying on Gunnery Camp – probably to Hohne – as a complete Regiment with a full fleet of vehicles. Well our experience in Mar-Apr 09 was very different. We deployed to Castlemartin, Wales for 4 weeks with only a handful of vehicles. Under Whole Fleet Management (WFM) the Regiment holds 15 x CR2 and 14 x CVR(T), and it was with these vehicles that we travelled to Pembrokeshire in early March to conduct Annual Firing. And yet despite the frictions of, for example, A and B Squadrons sharing 15 x CR2 between them or D Squadron missing 4½ firing days due to the fog, the Regiment shot extremely well and received the following comment in our Firing Report: *"overall this was a strong technical gunnery performance, certainly one of the best we have seen"*.

Moreover, we had not a little fun along the way. For instance, on the middle (changeover) weekend the entire Regiment celebrated Oates with skits, a parade and a regimental photo. Additionally Paddy's Day was held down at Castlemartin in the usual manner, and there were plentiful nights-out 'down-town' in Pembroke. And, as ever, SQMSs were making a killing on the ranges selling burgers and bacon 'sarnies'; and in that respect this Gunnery Camp was exactly the same as you will remember!

BATUS

Immediately following Easter Leave the majority of the Regiment departed for Canada, once again for a training event quite unlike any other previously encountered, but one which was enormously rewarding. The plan for BATUS saw four Battlegroups (BGs) deploying onto the Prairie during a 3 month period. RDG BG (incl POW, A & B Sqns) and 1 LANCS BG (incl C Sqn) would deploy on Ex Med Man 1 (MM1), and QRL BG and 1 SG BG (incl D Sqn) on MM2.

Significant sums have been spent on BATUS to give it a more contemporary feel and one more attuned to the hybrid threats we currently face. For example, there are now numerous

villages dotted around the Prairie thereby better facilitating judgemental shooting, Key Leader Engagement (KLE), C-IED and IDF drills etc. And yet despite having to generate (within 4 Mech Bde) our own OPFOR and indeed 'share' the Prairie with another BG, MM1 was without doubt the most challenging, rewarding and, importantly, relevant BATUS I have encountered. This was the first Med Man the Regiment had conducted for many years that had not been preceded by a period of field training in Poland or Salisbury Plain, but despite this the Regimental Battlegroup performed magnificently. Moreover, the exercise construct was such that over 320 members of the BG got to spend 4 days in the Rockies either riding, parachuting, canoeing, climbing or rafting, as well as many who 'took to the road' and experienced the delights of Northern America.

WIDER REGIMENTAL LIFE

But it has not been 'all work and no play...'. In addition to celebrating Paddy's Day and Oates in Castlemartin, and the majority of the Regiment conducting adventurous training in the Rockies, there has been time for other non-work related events, principally sport.

This year's Hodson's Horse clashed with Gunnery Camp in Castlemartin, nevertheless the Regiment still entered teams in every event. We won the football and were placed high enough in all the other events to come 2nd overall, just behind 9th/12th Royal Lancers. Another major sporting achievement saw us being crowned as the 2 Div Hockey Champions, beating AFC Harrogate in the final; sadly, commitments meant we could not compete in the Army Cup Semi-Finals (we received 1 day's notice). Finally on the sporting front, the football team has enjoyed a very good season. In addition to winning the Hodson's Horse football competition the Regimental team performed admirably in the Cavalry Cup (losing (just) in the semi-final). For the first time in ages we now have a team consisting solely of young Troopers and Craftsmen, 3 of which have been selected to play for the Army U21.

Finally on wider Regimental life, the Regiment hosted a farewell visit by John and Ness Etherington, our former Regimental Secretary and his wife. The visit consisted of 2 parts. First, there was a dinner in the Officers' Mess which was attended by every former Commanding Officer and Colonel of the Regiment (and their wives) during John's long and distinguished tenure as Regimental Secretary. It was a very special evening and the fact that every person who was invited actually attended speaks volumes for the esteem John and Ness are held in. And second, the serving Regiment showed its appreciation by presenting John with the Regimental Medal. Again, there was a wonderful turn-out and one could see the clearly visible reaction on the young Troopers' faces during the reading of John's citation as they realised how much this wonderful man had contributed to the Regiment during the past 50 years.

MANNING

Now that we have been back in the UK for about 8 months we are experiencing a slight increase in Notice to Terminates (NTT), much as we did following our move to Tidworth in 1997. It is therefore heartening to report that the RDG manning situation is moving slowly in the right direction: we are currently -22 set against an establishment of 405 RDG soldiers. One encouraging factor is the number of soldiers who have decided to rejoin the Regiment in the past few months (7 to date) and with any luck more will rejoin us soon. Perhaps I can ask those of you with friends who have expressed an interest in possibly rejoining the Regiment to contact the Adjutant (officers) or RCMO (soldiers) to pass on the relevant details.

Our efforts to enlist soldiers from within our local recruiting areas continue. All Squadrons have now forged firm links with their affiliated ACFs, as well as conducted some form of recruiting-based activity within their allocated area. Regrettably our positive recruiting efforts over the past few years have resulted in the recruiting grounds of South Yorkshire and East Riding being handed back to the Light Dragoons thereby concluding a short-term agreement that was established back in 1995. On a positive note however we should begin to see a surge in recruits from Northern Ireland in the coming years to offset this loss.

WHAT NEXT?

The Regiment will deploy on Leave for 3 weeks in August and then commence Mission Specific Training (MST) on 1 Sep 09 ahead of a possible deployment to Afghanistan in 2010. I say 'possible' deployment because the ORBAT for Ops next year is still unclear and will probably remain that way for a while yet. What is clear is that HQ 4 Mech Bde will deploy to Afghanistan next year in command of force elements both from within and out with the brigade, and as there are currently planned to be a significant number of the latter there is a reasonable chance that there will be some Regts/Bns within 4 Mech Bde who will not deploy on HERRICK in 2010. It is too early to predict which units will remain behind, but as a Regiment we must face-up to the following 2 facts: first, no Armoured Regiment has ever deployed on Op HERRICK; and second, now that Ops in Iraq have all but drawn to a close there are 36 Infantry Battalions available for Ops in Afghanistan (39 if you include the 3 x Cdo Regts). Nevertheless, The Royal Dragoon Guards will send at least a sub-unit (equipped with Viking) to Afghanistan in 2010, and we are doing our best to influence decisions such that significantly more of us get the opportunity to deploy there next year.

CHARITY

A plea on behalf of the Regimental Association, if I may. The majority of those who seek sponsorship for a particular charity currently favour Help for Heroes (H4H). I'm told H4H is doing exceptionally well – and quite right too – however, can I remind you that charity begins at home! Service Personnel (with 6 years service or more) have priorities status with all 'key worker' schemes in England – a parallel scheme is run in Scotland. Wales are committed to introducing provision with their new affordable home scheme to be launched soon. Since July 2008, personnel are now able to carry 'priority status' into civilian life for up to 12 months after leaving Services.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA - What is an LPA?)</u></p> <p>An LPA is a powerful legal document that allows someone they trust now (the Attorney) to make decisions on their behalf at a time in the future when they no longer wish to or are able to make those decisions themselves.</p> <p>There are Two Types of LPA:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A Property and Affairs LPA – allows a Donor to appoint an Attorney to make decisions about the management of their finance and property, for example paying bills or selling a property on their behalf. • A Personal Welfare LPA – gives a Donor the opportunity to appoint an Attorney to make decisions about their personal welfare, including healthcare and medical treatment. <p>When can an LPA be used?</p> <p>A Property and Affairs LPA can be used when the Donor still has capacity to make decisions, or when the Donor has lost capacity. A Personal Welfare LPA can only be used when the Donor has lost capacity. Furthermore, the LPA must be registered with the Office of the Public Guardian (OPG) before it can be used.</p> <p>www.publicguardian.gov.uk.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>The Chelsea Pensioners' Appeal</u></p> <p>In March of this year, HRH The Prince of Wales formerly opened the Margaret Thatcher Infirmary at The Royal Hospital Chelsea (RHC), enabling it to continue offering support for future generations of male and female soldiers. The new infirmary provides state of the art rooms and a significant physiotherapy capability, including one of only three hydro pools in London. It will provide support for around 300 Chelsea Pensioners (In-Pensioners) who live at RHC, should they become infirm and require care.</p> <p>In-Pensioners join at any age over 65 when they are healthy and able to participate in the full and rich life of the Royal Hospital. The average age of the In-Pensioners is 84. New Job-Finding Service for Veterans

With funding by the MOD Veterans Challenge Fund, the Regular Forces Employment Association (RFEA) has introduced an outreach system that could provide support for around 7,000 Early Service Leavers (ESL) each year.

RFEA

The Electronic Customer Relationship Management (CRM) System, along with their own job board provided and funded by BRAINHUNTER, will enable the RFEA to provide a job-finding service to Service Personnel who are ineligible for the formal MOD resettlement service when making their transition from Service to civilian life. The system will engage with Regular personnel who have served for less than 4 years or have been discharged administratively or for disciplinary reasons, or are Reservists who have completed at least one operational tour.

The CRM system will establish a state of the art registration system which will allow RFEA Specialist Employment Consultants (SEC) to provide a job matching service, give direction to educational and vocational training programme's and provide an online skills identification programme. It will also, using online facilities, provide a guidance programme to assist personnel to develop their interviewing skills and hone their personal and life skills. In addition, personnel will receive counselling and help developing their CVs.

Northern Ireland Veterans Association

Northern Ireland Veterans' Association have asked me to publicise their annual Service of Remembrance which takes place at the National Memorial Arboretum on Saturday 12 September 2009 at 11.30am. The Northern Ireland Veterans' Association (NIVA) remembers both those who laid down their lives and those who served in the province during the conflict and draw their members from all those who served the crown namely the Military, Police and Prison Service. Forces Discount Brochure

Take a look at www.forcesdiscounts-mod.co.uk for the wide-ranging discounts currently available to Service and ex-Service people. You can also subscribe to their regular newsletter. At the time of writing there were over 1,300 discounts available. Some require a certificate of eligibility (on the website) and MOD confirm that authorisation can be from your organisation to prove the individual had served.

Housing

Giving a Choice

Many Service Leavers choose to remain in the area where they have served. Changes to housing legislation in December 2008 now mean they will no longer be penalised for 'not having a local connection' when applying for social housing. The legislation applies to England and Wales, with guidance issued to Local Authorities and Registered Social Landlords. It is hoped that Scotland will follow suit in the future.

Priority Housing

In April, new guidance was issued to Local Authorities (England and Wales) advising that seriously injured personnel must be treated as priority when allocating modified housing. The decision is designed to help ensure better availability of specially adapted housing with features such as walk in bathrooms, wider door frames, lowered light switches, and entry slopes rather than steps.

Armed Forces Compensation Scheme and War Pension payments for the most seriously disabled are now disregarded from the means test for Disabled Facility Grants issued by Local Authorities in England and Wales. The grants will help with the costs of adapting their homes.

The maximum available grant is £20,000.

ARE YOU IN A PRIORITY NEED CATEGORY

There are a variety of applicants that are recognised as having a priority need for accommodation. As a veteran, legislation identifies this category in the following ways:

Under the Housing Act 1996 in England and Wales, priority need includes:

A person who is vulnerable as the result of having been a member of HM Regular Forces (England Only);

A person formerly serving in the Regular Armed Forces who has been homeless since leaving the Forces (Wales Only).

Under the Housing (Scotland) Act 1987, priority need in Scotland includes:

A person having been discharged from any part of the Regular Armed Forces of the Crown.

HELP FOR SERVICE LEAVERS & VETERANS

Joint Service Housing Advice Office (JSHAO) provides Service Personnel, Service Leavers and ex Service Personnel still occupying Service Family Accommodation as Irregular

Occupants with comprehensive advice on housing options including civilian housing information, advice and where possible placement into social housing. It educates and encourages Service personnel to make civilian housing provision throughout their Service career. It helps separated RN, Army and RAF families in the UK and those returning from overseas to find appropriate accommodation.

Through this service the project aims to reduce the likelihood of ex-service personnel becoming homeless or sleeping rough after discharge.
